

What is a Registered Nurse or Registered Nursing Associate?

- To practise lawfully as a registered nurse/nursing associate in the United Kingdom, the practitioner must hold a current and valid registration with the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC)
- Registration obtained by successfully completing a program of study validated by NMC

 The title "registered nurse" or 'Nurse Associate" can only be granted to those holding such registration; this protected title is laid down in UK Law; Nurses, Midwives and Health Visitors Act 1997

What is nursing?

"Nursing encompasses autonomous and collaborative care of individuals of all ages, families, groups and communities, sick or well and in all settings.

It includes the promotion of health, the prevention of illness, and the care of ill, disabled and dying people."

Studying Nursing at University of Worcester Nursing Courses

BSc (Hons) Nursing – Adult/Child/Mental Health

- 3 year
- 45 week course
- 37 ½ hour week
- 7 weeks annual leave

Foundation Degree (Fd) Nursing Associate

- 2 year
- 40 week course
- 7 weeks annual leave

Both courses consist of: 50% Theory and 50% Clinical Practice

Entry Requirements	Qualifications. UK.
112 UCAS Points or above	3 Full A levels (BBC or above)
OR	BTEC Extended Diploma (DMM or above)
OR	ACCESS Diploma (full award 60 credits; 45 credits L3 with at least 30 Credits at Merit or Distinction) *We do NOT accept NVQ's level 2 or 3*
OR	Higher qualifications e.g. Bachelors degree
<u>AND</u>	GCSE English C/4 or above Alternates include Functional skills Level 2 English
<u>AND</u>	GCSE Mathematics C/4 or above Alternatives include Functional skills Level 2 maths
<u>AND</u>	Evidence of study in past five years and a Favourable Academic reference.









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
